

# **Corpus Christi Catholic School**

## **Admissions' Policy 2012/2013**

Corpus Christi Catholic School is a voluntary aided school in the Diocese of Southwark. It is in the trusteeship of the Diocese. The school is conducted by its Governing Body as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with its Trust Deed and Instrument of Government, and seeks at all times to be a witness to Jesus Christ.

As a Catholic School, we aim to provide a Catholic education for all our pupils. At a Catholic school, Catholic doctrine and practice permeates every aspect of the school's activity. It is essential that the Catholic character of the school's education is fully supported by all families in the school.

The Governors welcome all applicants but as a Catholic school we exist primarily to serve the Catholic community and priority is given to baptised, Catholic children who have one or two parents who are committed practising members of the Catholic Church. If insufficient applications are received in respect of baptised Catholic children, the Governing Body will admit practising Christians from other denominations and then, subject to the availability of places, from those of other faiths who support the religious ethos of the school.

The Governing Body has responsibility for admissions to the school and, having consulted with the local authority and other admissions authorities, intends to admit 45 pupils to the Reception class. Children will be admitted at the beginning of the school year in which they become five.

The Governors may admit up to 52 children into the Nursery class.

Note: Admission to the Nursery class does not automatically guarantee a place in the main school. Applicants will be required to apply for a place in Reception.

**Where the number of applications for admissions exceeds the number of places available, the Governing Body will apply the following criteria, in the order of priority set out below, to decide which children to admit.**

1. Baptised, Catholic 'looked after' children.
2. Baptised, Catholic children who have one or two parents who are practising Catholics and who live or worship in the parishes of Corpus Christi (Brixton Hill), St. Philip & St. James (Herne Hill) or St. Simon and St. Jude (Streatham Hill) parishes.
3. Baptised, Catholic children who have one or two parents who are practising Catholics and attend Mass regularly at neighbouring parishes which do not have their own Catholic school.
4. Baptised, Catholic children who have one or two parents who are practising Catholics and attend Mass regularly at neighbouring parishes which do have their own Catholic school.
5. Other 'looked after' children.

6. Children of parents who are adherents to the Eastern Christian Churches including Orthodox Churches and who have no access to a school of their own denomination. Evidence of Baptism or reception from the authorities of that Church will be required.
7. Children of families who are committed members of other Christian denominations that are part of Churches Together in England. Evidence of Baptism (or dedication) provided by a priest or minister of a designated place of worship will be required.
8. Children who are members of other faiths. Evidence of membership of the faith of religious commitment provided by a priest, minister or religious leader of a designated place of worship will be required
9. Any other children.

**If there is over-subscription in any of the above categories, the Governing Body will apply the following sub-criteria to decide which children to admit.**

- i. Children with a sibling at the school at the intended time of admission.
- ii. Children attending Corpus Christi nursery class.
- iii. For categories 2, 3, 4 above, the strength of evidence of commitment to the faith as demonstrated by the level of the family's Mass attendance on Sundays will increase the priority of an application within each category. Priority will be further increased by length of time of Catholic practice.
- iv. For categories 6, 7, 8 above, the strength of evidence of commitment to the faith as demonstrated by the level of the family's attendance at services will increase the priority of an application within each category. Applications will only be considered where this evidence is provided in a reference from the priest, minister or faith leader at the church where the family worship.
- v. The Governing Body may increase the priority of an application within a category where evidence is provided at the time of application of an exceptional social, medical or pastoral need of the child which made the school particularly suitable for the child in question.
- vi. All other children in that category, with those living nearer the school receiving higher priority. Within criteria 2, places allocated using the distance criteria, will be in proportion to the number of applications received from each of the 3 named parishes.

*NOTES (these notes form part of the oversubscription criteria)*

- a. 'Looked after' children has the same meaning as in Section 22 of the Children's Act 1989, and means any child in the care of a

local authority or provided with accommodation by them (e.g., children with foster parents).

- b. 'Catholic' means a member of the Catholic Church or a Church in full communion with the See of Rome. This includes the Eastern Catholic Churches. This will normally be evidenced by a certificate of Baptism in a Catholic church or a certificate of reception into full communion of the Catholic Church.
- c. Reference to other Christian denominations refers to other denominations that are full members of Churches Together in England.
- d. By 'committed practising members of the Catholic Church' we mean at least one parent and the children attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation as a central part of their lives. Within criteria 2,3 and 4 places will be allocated firstly to those who attend Mass weekly, secondly to those who attend Mass three times a month, thirdly to those who attend Mass fortnightly, fourthly to those who attend monthly and finally to those who attend less than once a month. The length of time a parent has been practising will also increase their priority within this criteria, with those whose commitment is over 2 years receiving priority over those whose commitment is under 2 years within each, subject to regularity of attendance being the same. However, the governors will ensure that Catechumens and those where it is not possible to prove previous practice elsewhere (e.g. refugee situations) are not disadvantaged by this element of the criteria.
- e. A sibling is defined as a full brother or sister or step/half brother or sister living at the same address, a child who is living as part of the family unit by reason of a Court Order or a child who has been placed with foster carers as a result of being 'looked after' by the authority.
- f. 'Nearer the school' will be measured as the distance from the child's home to the main reception office entrance of the school in Trent Road in a straight, line using Local Authority recommended software.
- g. To demonstrate an exceptional social, medical or pastoral need of the child which can be most appropriately met at this school, the Governing Body will require formal written evidence from an appropriate professional such as a social worker, doctor or priest.

## **Admission Procedure**

To apply for a place at this school, you should complete and return **two** sets of separate forms.

1. The **Common Application Form** available from the school or the Local Authority where you and/or you child live. This form **must** be

returned to the Local Authority where you live by their published closing date. Alternatively, you may apply on-line using the website of the Local Authority where you live.

2. The **School Supplementary Information Form and Priest's Reference Form** available from the school should be completed and **returned to the school.**

Completion of the Supplementary Information Form is not mandatory; however, if one is not received the Governors will not be able to apply their admission criteria in regard to religious practice and the application will be considered under the 'all other children' category.

The closing date for the School Supplementary Information Form is 1<sup>st</sup> February prior to the September of the school year in which the child is due to attend the reception class.

You will be advised of the outcome of your application by letter, usually before the beginning of May. You will receive a letter from the local authority followed by a letter from the governing body.

If you are unsuccessful you may ask the school for the reasons, related to the oversubscription criteria listed above, and you have the right of appeal to an independent appeal panel.

Both the Supplementary Information Form and the Common Application Form and Priest's reference form need to be completed if you wish your son/daughter to be considered for a place under the religious criteria. You are advised to make a copy of the forms for your records.

**Admission of children below compulsory school age.**

The governors will provide for the admission of all children in the September following their fourth birthday. Parents can request that the date their child is admitted to the school is deferred until later in the school year or until the child reaches compulsory school age in that school year; parents may also request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age.

**Appeals**

Parents whose applications for places are unsuccessful may appeal to an Independent Appeal Panel set up in accordance with sections 88 and 94 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998. Appeals must be made in writing and must set out the reasons on which the appeal is made. Appeals should be made to the Admissions Appeal Clerk at the school address. Appellants have the right to make oral representations to the Appeal Panel.

**In-year (casual) admissions.**

Applications for a place at the school in-year must be made using the common application form of the local authority (LA) where your child resides. This form must be returned to the same LA. The school's supplementary form should also be completed to enable the governors to rank the application in the event of there being more than one application for a place. The governors will use the same criteria to rank the application as that listed above. The offer of a place at the school will be made by the LA on behalf of the governors. In the event of the governors deciding that a place cannot be offered parents will be offered the opportunity of placing their child's name on

the waiting list. This does not prevent parents from exercising their right to appeal against the decision not to offer a place.

### **Waiting Lists**

Parents of children who have not been offered a place at the school may ask for their child's name to be placed on a waiting list. The waiting list will be operated using the criteria listed above. Placing your child's name on the waiting list does not guarantee that a place will become available. This does not prevent parents from exercising their right to appeal against the decision not to offer a place. The waiting list will be maintained for one academic year.

### **Late Applications**

Any late applications will be considered by the school, in the event of there being any available places using the school's admissions criteria. If all places have been filled, parents will be offered the opportunity of placing their child's name on the waiting list. This does not prevent parents from exercising their right to appeal against the decision not to offer a place.
